Mary Karapetian Alvord, Ph.D. is director and sole owner of Alvord, Baker & Associates, LLC, a multi-disciplinary, multi-site private practice in Maryland. She is currently the APA public education coordinator for Maryland. She is the author/coauthor of publications on resilience, social competence and media ethics. Her clinical expertise, developed over the past 30 years, includes Cognitive Behavior Therapy for anxiety and self-regulation disorders, social competence, group therapy and a range of integrative treatments for children and adolescents. Dr. Alvord is a recipient of the American Psychological Association's Presidential Innovative Practice Citation (2009).

Gonzalo Bacigalupe, Ed.D., MPH, is Associate Professor and Chair of the Department of Counseling and School Psychology, and Director of the Family Therapy Program at the University of Massachusetts Boston. He is also an Adjunct Research Professor at the Family Medicine & Community Health, UMASS Medical School. Dr. Bacigalupe is Associate Editor of Family Systems & Health and Editorial Board Member of several referee journals. His research includes: transnational families and couples, political and family violence, refugees and immigrants' health and health disparities (chronic pain, medication strategies and literacy, asthma), and qualitative data analysis software. He has been Senior Fulbright Research Fellow, an APF grantee, and an UMASS E-Fellow.

Allyson Baker, Psy.D. earned her doctorate in clinical psychology at Nova Southeastern University in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida in 2002. She completed her internship at the University of Massachusetts Medical School/Worcester State Hospital. Bob spent his professional career working for VA in various clinical and leadership roles. In his last position as a national mental health program official, he was responsible for psychosocial rehabilitation and recovery oriented services.
